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### GRAND MASTERS REPORT

AT THE 2022 WESTERN CHALLENGE, HAL BOWMAN US1277 & MIKE BLOOM US321 TOOK UP ANOTHER CHALLENGE TO SAIL IN THE 2023 GRAND MASTERS, A REGATTA FOR DN SAILORS 60 YEARS AND OLDER, BECOMING THE FIRST NORTH AMERICANS TO PARTICIPATE IN THE 4 YEAR HISTORY OF THE EVENT.

t the Western Challenge Regatta in December 2022, Dideric Van Riemsdijk S867 encouraged Mercedes Auger and me to consider attending the Grand Master's race the second week of February in Sweden. At age eighty-eight and after traveling to races from Montana to Lake Baikal in Siberia, we had parked foreign iceboat plans. But a last trip to Sweden sounded inviting.

Dideric and Richard Gusting S713 promised to smooth out the details, so we signed on. It was a good decision. Mike Bloom US321 joined us as the U.S. contingent, along with Deb Whitehorse. Deb and Mercedes helped with the scoring.

The venue was ideal at Rättvik, about 140 miles northwest of Stockholm. The town is on the east end of Siljan, an ancient lake created by a 35-mile diameter hole from a meteorite strike 377 million years ago. Our hotel was perched on a hill overlooking the launch site less than a mile away. It had a friendly staff and excellent food and was a favored dining spot for the town judging from the crowds of locals there in the evenings,

The first two days, seven races were sailed in light air on good ice with light streaks of snow. I was slow but able to keep the boat moving and avoid the "ole guy" issue of having to climb in and out of a dead boat. Got a DSQ in one race when someone knocked down the leeward mark, and I finished below the Darling mark, which was the same color. That's my excuse, and I'm sticking to it. I told Dideric to buy and bill me for different colored "Bowman Memorial" Darling marks. Haven't seen the invoice yet. All I'll say about my performance is I wasn't last.

My report to my North Carolina golf buddies back home was I won hardware as winner of the over seventyfive age class. None of them asked how many were in that group; two. The race was called on the third day with winds gusting over twenty knots and the Swedes anxious to move on to their national ranking race scheduled that weekend. One of my objectives was to get my high-quality, borrowed boat back in Dideric's trailer without the scuffs, scratches, and cleat marks on US 1277 back in the States. Mission accomplished. There were a lot of good senior sailors from eight different countries in the regatta, with thirty-three entrants. Thomas Lindgren S81 finished as the Grand Master.

On a more somber note, Richard Gusting was there to sail and help Dideric with the regatta organization. He was in his usual cheerfully good form but obviously not well, suffering from a respiratory infection. He still managed to sail well and finished seventh. He celebrated his birthday during the regatta, and we annoyed the local diners at the hotel by singing happy



birthday to him multiple times. The illness worsened and eventually ended his life two months later.

Richard was a good friend, always available to help with international travel plans. In 2019 Merc and I made a two-week summer visit to Sweden. While in Stockholm, we had a delightful lunch with Thomas Lindgren and solved all the world's problems. Richard was out of town but arranged two tickets for us on a day cruise from the Stockholm harbor to the villages on islands east out the channels to the Baltic Sea. It was a memorable day and a very thoughtful gift. Richard was certainly one of the international DN fleet's "good guys" and will be much missed.

The Sweden Grand Masters could well be our last DN regatta (yet to be determined). It's difficult to think of giving up the adrenaline rush that comes with rounding the weather mark on good ice, ten knots wind on two runners, and then getting the boost at ninety degrees on down the course to a smooth jibe ending at full speed with the nose pointed twelve o'clock to the finish line. I'm preaching to the choir, but those are some of the best memories you have at an advanced age. But if it's over, it was a fitting conclusion to over fifty years in the DN fleet.

Sweden is a beautiful, hospitable country, and the Swedish sailors are experts at organizing a regatta. For North American senior DN iceboaters who want at least one low-key European regatta, it's a good choice. Put it on your Bucket List.


# DN TECH: PLANK RELEASE SYSTEM

REPLACING THE STUD PLATES FOR SAFETY & EASE OF OPERATION BY BOB GRAY US4654

on Sherry US44 asked me to pass along the following information about the plank release system that I designed and have been using.

Most U.S. sailors use the Sarns stud plate and alternate long plate system to fasten their planks to their hull. This setup works fine until you hit something, your plank separates, and the stud plate trashes the bottom of your boat. Several years ago, I got tired of replacing the bottom skin on my boat and developed a system that keeps the alternate plates but replaces the stud plates.


My fixture is a 3/8" thick piece of aluminum bar stock drilled and tapped to accept 3/8" nylon studs. The pictures and drawing below are self-explanatory. The studs can be moved to the various tapped holes to allow the plank to be placed in the desired position on the alternate plates.



When I first experimented with this setup, I sailed the boat with just one stud on each side. I sailed it in about 15-knot winds on very rough ice for several hours without any problems. I've been sailing this setup with two studs on each side for about four

years. In that time, I've been deplanked twice, once while crossing an open seam and the second time in a crash with another boat. There was absolutely no damage to the bottom of the boat in either instance.

After the seam incident, I put two new studs in the unused threaded holes and sailed and raced again in about 20 minutes. After the crash, I had to replace some broken parts, but I was sailing again that day.





There are other systems that I'm sure work equally well. A friend of mine has a similar setup using two drilled-out aluminum studs and two nylon studs. I should mention that the nylon studs shear clean off in a deplanking. They eventually have to be removed from the aluminum bars. I use an "Easy Out" to do this (Easy Outs are cheap, and many hardware stores carry them).

Ron asked me to mention one other thing. In my crash at the 2023 Gold Cup, I was thrown out of my boat and ended up under both boats. I didn't realize until later that the tiller and the square aluminum tube in it had separated from my boat. I have always been very concerned about being seriously injured by the tiller in a crash. I felt it would be really nice if the tiller would shear off in a big hit. The problem is that it's attached with a 3/8" steel bolt to the steering head. My solution was to replace the steel bolt with a nylon bolt. It must have worked since it separated, and I wasn't hurt.

I had sailed my boat with that same nylon bolt for a number of years without any problems. I hope this helps out. Safety and ease of operation should be a goal for all of us. See you on the ice.

# STAGGERED STARTS

### AN IDEA TO EQUALIZE STARTS FOR DIFFERENT AGE GROUPS BY ANDRÉ BABY KC4360

s we racers get on in years, nature inevitably takes its toll and our expectations, including those in the iceboat racing world, must be modified.

As in all sailing races, the start is a key component of a successful race: if you can't run as fast as the other guys, you often end up sailing in their dirty air, and you are off to a bad start. At best, you claw your way back to the middle of the fleet, but more often than not, you end up at the tail end of it. After awhile, one's enthusiasm and motivation decline, and lead to questioning if one should race at all.

A few years ago, during the New England Championships on Lake Winnipesaukee, I suggested to James "T" Thieler, the PRO, that we try a staggered start: all those racers over 70 years old, ones with running impediments, such as replaced hips, knees etc.. would start at the drop of the first of two flags. Approximately. 5 seconds later, T would drop the second flag, and the rest of the fleet would start.

The formula worked: all of us "mature" sailors got off to a clean start, and the young "gazelles" usually caught up to us shortly thereafter, but we started sailing at roughly the same time. At the first windward mark, the faster sailors took the lead. The overall objective of keeping older sailors in the game was met, and all were pleased with the results.

At a time when we as a class are trying to keep as many sailors as active racers as possible, I believe this formula could be applied to higher levels of racing. In its effort to keep as many racers as possible, the Laser class has a formula for equalizing different age groups, so we should seriously consider doing the same. The staggered start method is easy to apply, and does not impose any additional burden on the scorers who record the results in the usual fashion.

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# **DN CHINA**

EIGHT JINZHOU ICE YACHT CLUB MEMBERS TRAVELED WITH THEIR DNS ON AN EPIC JOURNEY THROUGH MONGOLIA TO LAKE BAIKAL

inzhou, China, has become the center of DN ice yachting in China. China Daily Global News says, "Jinzhou is known for the winds that blow across the city from the ocean throughout the year... the city has a sea breeze ideal for sailing and sail boarding." Jinzhou has positioned itself as an aquatic sailing center by building a sailing facility developed for international competitions.

In 2020, IDNIYRA mailed DN plans to Jinzhou Yachting and Sailing Association, founded in 2018, and they built many DNs. DN China became an official member of IDNIYRA Europe in 2019.

On March 21, 2023, the 8-member Jinzhou Ice Sailing Team set off from Jinzhou, China, via Mongolia and crossed the Mongolian Desert to compete in Baikal Race Week in Siberia, Russia. It was the first time Chinese DN sailors competed in an international event. The team faced many challenges during the four-day journey to and from Lake Baikal.



On the way to Baikal, they drove through the worst Mongolian sandstorm in ten years, while on the way back, a snowstorm forced them to detour 300 km across the Gobi desert, where their vehicle got stuck in a swamp!

FROM REPORTS ON DN CHINA'S FIRST INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION SUBMITTED BY JÖRG BOHN G747, DMITRIY KACHIN R7, AND DN CHINA



Despite the travel challenges, the team experienced fantastic competition, learned more about the DN, and, most importantly, established friendships with the Russian, German, and Swiss DN communities.



Wang Qiguang CH999, president of the Jinsailing Association, made rapid progress from not finishing the first two races to a 12th-place finish on the last day, finishing 17th overall out of 28. Member Wu Ming's CH006 best result on the last day was 13th, finishing 20th overall. Member Yang Shu CH888 took 23rd place, which was beyond expectations. Members Liu Ran, Ning Zuoli, An Xu, Liu Haibo, and Zhou Yongquan provided shore team services such as equipment to the Jinzhou team.

The China National Sailing Association has committed to promoting and popularizing ice sailing. They expect more young people to join the Ice Optimist team, and more sailing enthusiasts will participate in the ice sailing experience—training and learning the handling abilities of ice yachts.



Wang Qiguang explained, "In the future, we will continue to participate in competitions on Lake Baikal, and we really want to take part in competitions in Vladivostok. We have built many ice boats DN ourselves. The drawings of our shipbuilding of that time were downloaded and purchased on the IDNIYRA website. More DN and Ice Optimist ice boats will be built in the future."

Dmitry Kachin R7: "The Chinese took many of photos of our boats and measured everything that could be measured. Even my entire trailer was photographed. We can expect similar boats for the next season. They are good sailors; even in strong wind and bad ice, they walked with dignity and were not afraid. They are real enthusiastic guys and will build

new DNs and equipment for the following season. They were very happy and will be back."

"Look at these children under ten; some are only five or six years old. There is no parent to accompany the whole process, and their life is arranged in a unified way. Like me, the children organized the equipment and moved and adjusted the boat.

When the starting line opened, they rushed forward like battlefield warriors. The children must keep track of how many laps they've completed, and there is no way to guide them while they are sailing. These are relatively easy tasks.

What is more difficult is distinguishing wind direction, accurately grasping the wind shifts, adjusting their course and heading, tightening the sail shape and string, and avoiding collisions, because ice sails are very dangerous when they collide with each other at high speed.
